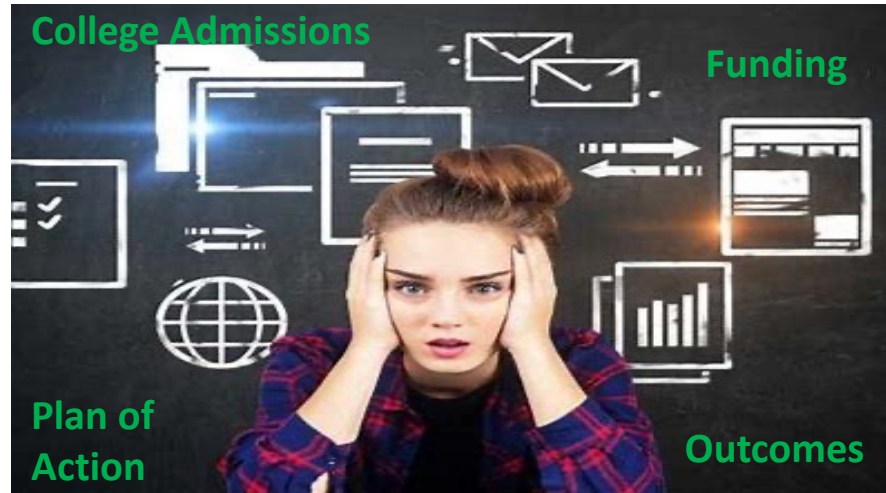

- Students and parents **lack the time to apply to colleges** and for **scholarships**.

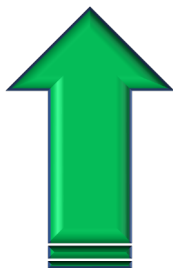

3. Choose Majors and Colleges

Choosing a Major or Degree Program

- ❖ Identify your interests, values, passions, and abilities.
- ❖ Get assistance from parents, counselors, and/or trusted advisors.
- ❖ Don't overspecialize (reduces career prospects if too narrow).
- ❖ Browse majors and learn more about them at:

- ❖ Use online tools to help you research careers or majors.

- ❖ Make a list of potential careers or majors.

3. Choose Majors and Colleges

Career and College Opportunities

- ❖ There's about 2,000 colleges in the U.S.
- ❖ Vocational/Trade schools:
 - ❖ Teaches a skill or trade for a specific job.
 - ❖ Electrician, Auto Mechanic, HVAC Technician, Plumber, Dental Hygienist, etc.
 - ❖ Most programs are about 2 years.
 - ❖ Obtain a license, certification or certificate.
- ❖ Two-year college:
 - ❖ Community or junior college.
 - ❖ Obtain an associate's degree.
- ❖ Four-year college:
 - ❖ Undergraduate coursework.
 - ❖ Obtain a bachelor's degree.



3. Choose Majors and Colleges

Public and Private Colleges

- ❖ Public college:
 - ❖ Primarily funded by a state government.
 - ❖ Generally larger than private schools.
 - ❖ In-state - students pay in-state tuition.
 - ❖ Out-of-state – students living out of state likely pay more tuition.
- ❖ Private college:
 - ❖ Often operates as an educational, non-profit organization.
 - ❖ Does not receive primary funding from a state government.
 - ❖ One tuition rate (whether in-state or out-of-state).
 - ❖ Usually more costly than public schools.

Predominantly White Institutions (PWI)



- ❖ Institutions of higher learning.
- ❖ Particularly four-year colleges and universities.
- ❖ Whites make up 50% or more of the student.
- ❖ Can be public or private.
- ❖ More than 9 million students attend PWIs in the U.S.

Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCU)



- ❖ HBCUs existed for almost 200 years.
- ❖ African-Americans were unable to pursue an education at white institutions so HBCUs were created to educate African-Americans.
- ❖ There are currently 107 HBCU's in the United States.
- ❖ More than 228,000 students are enrolled at HBCUs.
- ❖ Can be public or private.
- ❖ HBCUs provide an affordable education.

3. Choose Majors and Colleges

Choosing the Right College

- ❖ Research colleges and compile a list of college admission requirements & costs. **(Recommend top 5-10 colleges)**
- ❖ Find a college that fits your personality, background, interest and goals.
- ❖ Consider affordability (the cost of attendance & how much you can pay).
- ❖ Rank the college factors that are important to you:
 - ❖ Courses and degree programs.
 - ❖ Location of school from home (especially after COVID-19).
 - ❖ Campus size.
 - ❖ Ratio of students to teachers.
 - ❖ Traditional, distance learning, or blended.
- ❖ Use an online search tool to help you research colleges.

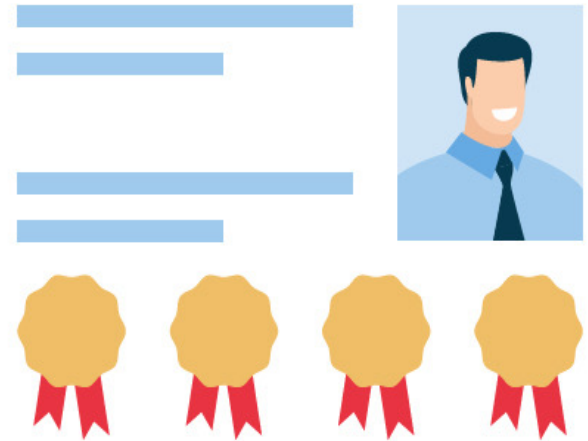

Scholar Profile Strategies

- ❖ Assess your strengths and areas of improvement.
- ❖ Look for gaps in your scholar profile, then fill them.
- ❖ Update your scholar profile (frequently).
 - ❖ Summer break
 - ❖ Winter break
- ❖ Include the scholar profile with applications only if additional documents can be attached.

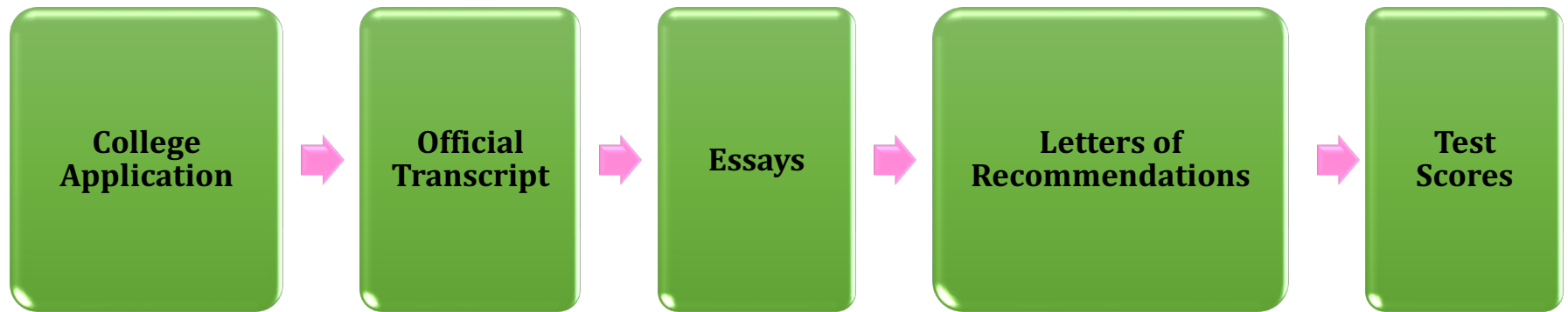

5. Apply to College

College Application Parts



- ❖ Follow each college's application instructions (they differ)
- ❖ Ways to apply:
 - ❖ Electronically (University or a web portal)
 - ❖ By mail
- ❖ College application fee – varies for each college (\$0 - \$100)

5. Apply to College

When to Apply to Colleges

- ❖ Apply during the FALL of your senior year (Sept - Dec).
- ❖ Early Decision (Deadline usually November 1 – 15th):
 - ❖ Can only apply to one school early decision.
 - ❖ Binding agreement you will enroll in that institution, if accepted.
 - ❖ Sends the strongest message that college is your top choice.
- ❖ Early Action (Deadline usually November 1 - 15th):
 - ❖ Apply early to as many schools as you want.
 - ❖ Does not require you to commit to the college.
 - ❖ Enables you to compare financial aid packages among several colleges and universities before accepting or declining the offer.
- ❖ Both ED and EA decisions generally made by mid December.
- ❖ National response deadline to enroll is usually May 1st.

5. Apply to Colleges

The Common Application (App)

www.commonapp.org

- ❖ Students can submit one college applications to about 900 colleges.
- ❖ Create an account/profile and then search colleges.
- ❖ Research and apply to multiple colleges through one website portal.
- ❖ New application opens on August 1st of each year.
- ❖ Reused when applying for multiple colleges on the site.
- ❖ Applicants can use the Common App for free.
- ❖ Each college may have an application fee (varying amounts).
- ❖ Roughly 45% of participating schools do not charge an application fee.



5. Apply to College

The Common Black College Application (App)

www.commonblackcollegeapp.com

- ❖ Students can submit one college applications to about 55 HBCUs.
- ❖ Create an account and apply to multiple colleges for about \$20.
- ❖ Select your top HBCUs to apply.
- ❖ Upload your test scores.
- ❖ Research and apply to multiple colleges through one website.
- ❖ Reused when applying for multiple colleges on the site.

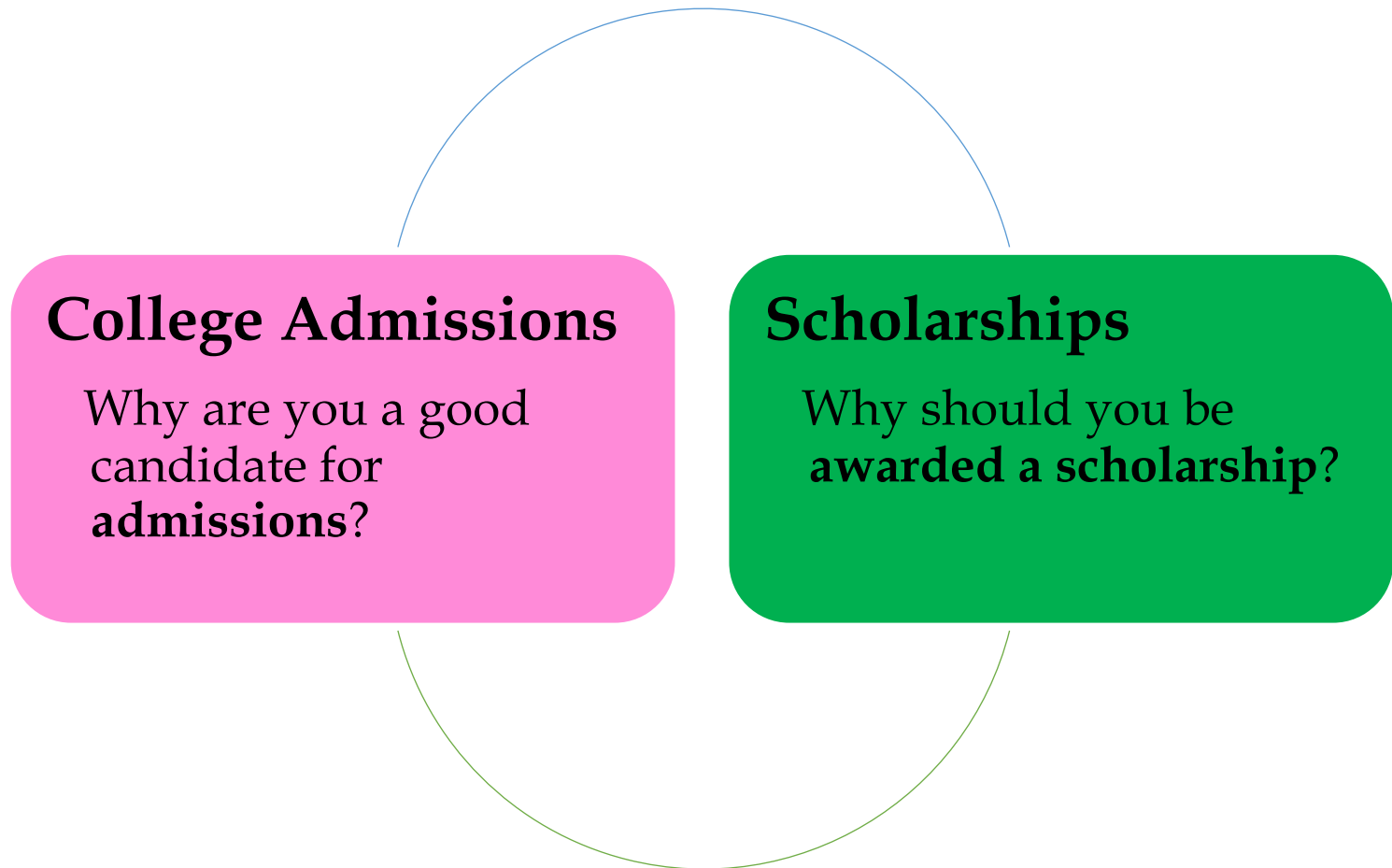
5. Apply to College **Official Transcripts**

- ❖ Formal copies of a student's official high school academic grades have grades from freshman to junior year.
- ❖ Know the process to request transcripts and follow it precisely.
- ❖ Parental permission may be required at your high school prior to requesting transcripts.
- ❖ Request to have official high school transcripts for all of the colleges you applied to.
- ❖ Most high schools will either mail or email your official transcripts to colleges.
- ❖ Double check with the colleges to verify receipt by the deadline, and follow-up with your high school.

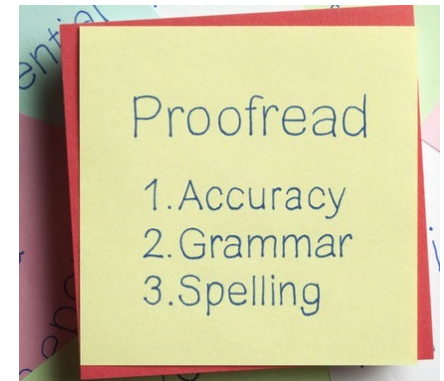


5. Apply to College Essay Writing Steps



5. *Apply to College* Essay Writing Guidance

- ❖ Draft essays early and prepare to revise multiple times.
- ❖ Find trusted individuals to proofread and critique your writing (i.e. teacher).
- ❖ Use free online proofreading resources (i.e. Grammarly).
- ❖ Follow directions (type, word count).
- ❖ Adhere to submission deadlines.
- ❖ Address the specific essay topic or question.
- ❖ Write on various topics and save them all.
- ❖ Demonstrate knowledge of college/entity (facts/statistics).
- ❖ Share how you will make a difference.
- ❖ Save and re-use content for multiple applications.

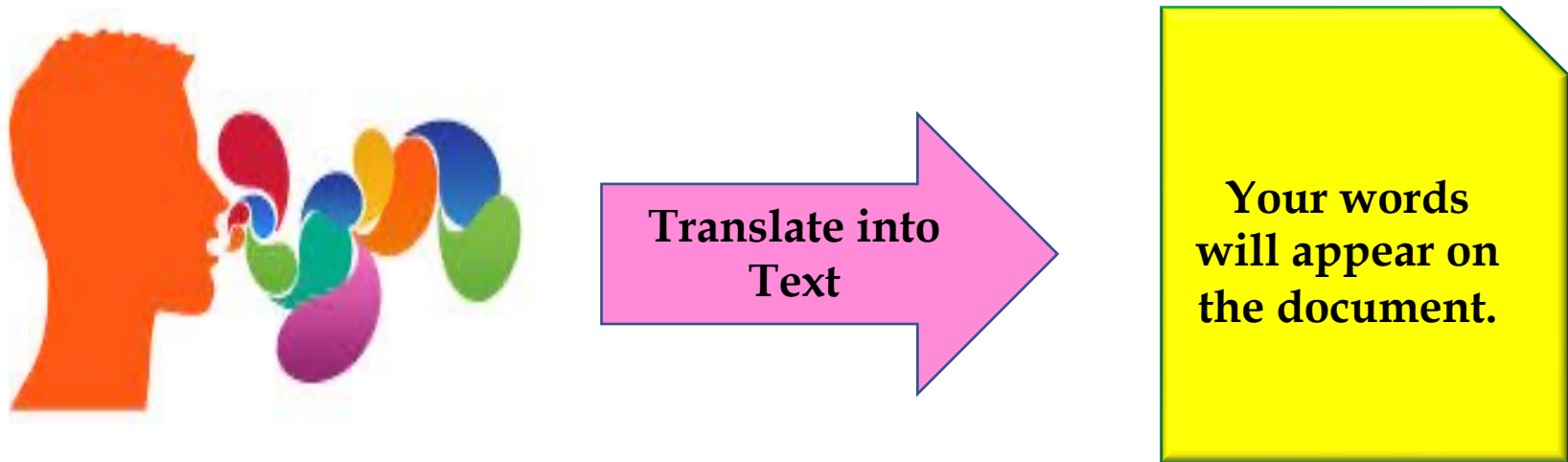
Essay Writing Guidance

- ❖ Develop a brief outline to organize your thoughts into manageable sections.
 - ❖ Introduction (include a thesis statement)
 - ❖ Body (three main points)
 - ❖ Conclusion
- ❖ You may pick a topic or instructed to write on a particular topic.
- ❖ Ten common essay themes include:

Career/Major	Contribution
Challenges	Creativity
Change	Financial need
Character	Leadership
Community Service	Personal Statement

5. Apply to College **Hate Writing? Use Text Dictation**



- ❖ Google Docs in Chrome browser is a great tool.

Tools ----> Voice Typing

- ❖ Test it out before using it on an important paper.
- ❖ Be prepared to edit your paragraphs and wording.

5. Apply to College

Proofread and Finalize Your Essay

- ❖ Never submit an essay you have not proofread
- ❖ Read your paper out loud
- ❖ Proof-read your paper:
 - ❖ Clarity
 - ❖ Complete sentences
 - ❖ Sentence structure
 - ❖ Alignment (introduction, body, conclusion)
- ❖ Find trusted individual(s) to proofread and critique your writing (i.e. teacher).

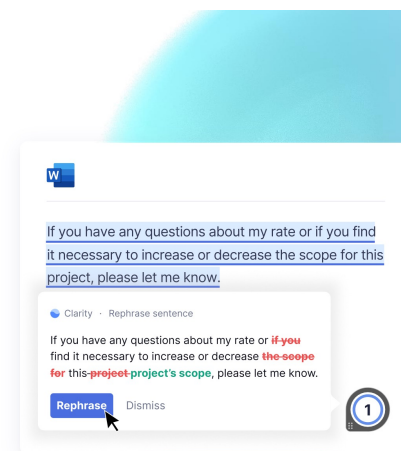

5. Apply to College

Letters of Recommendation

- Make a list of potential recommenders:
 - Teachers (establish a rapport during the school year)
 - School Counselors
 - Coaches
 - Employers
 - Community Leaders
- Provide recommenders with submission instructions.
- Set recommenders deadlines 1-2 weeks before your deadline.
- Follow-up to make sure letters are received by the deadline.
- Save and re-use content for multiple applications.
- Provide a Scholar Profile with your recommendation request.
- Offer a pre-drafted letter of recommendation for them to tailor.

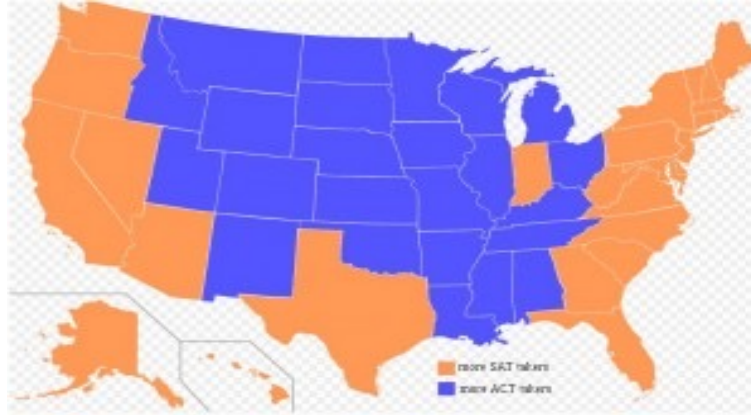

Take Both SAT/ACT Tests



- ❖ Measures what students learned in school to determine success in college.
- ❖ Some regions take the **ACT** while others take the **SAT**
- ❖ More colleges are making these test optional:
 - ❖ Essay, academics will be weighted heavier
 - ❖ May be needed for merit-based scholarships
- ❖ Send your SAT/ACT scores to your top 5 schools
